6. **Marketing & Hospitality Committee** – Welcomes new residents and helps support them as they transition into their new home and community. The committee also partners with the Marketing Department in hosting guests and prospective residents during campus visits and events.
7. **Residential Services Committee** – Serves as a liaison between residents and the Health & Wellness Department and to promote clear communication and support services such as technology-related needs.
8. **Spiritual Services Committee** – Assists the Chaplain in developing, supporting, and implementing programs and opportunities for spiritual growth, connection, and fellowship.
9. **Nominating Committee** – Active during the months of February and March each year, this committee presents candidates for President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer of the Resident Council.

CCA met Tuesday, May 19 with 12 residents and 2 staff members attending.

A new educational campaign regarding Sara Alert pendants and their importance has been initiated. A question-and-answer flyer is being provided today. An article written by Sarah Hester has already appeared in Chit Chat with information regarding how important this is to all of us.

At our meeting we received the usual monthly report of pertinent information regarding care in CWC and AL...information such as call light response times, number of patient falls, staffing issues, CARE awards, etc.

In the time for call bell responses there was an increase over previous month's average time of about 1 minute. Staff will now be looking into whether any one patient's call bell is being rung more frequently than others, or if staff response to call lights does not meet expected promptness.

The other monthly report regarding Sara alert calls was given by Karla. Once again emphasizing the importance of the SARA alert system.

CCA continues its Meet and Greet coffee hours between several residents and several CWC staff members. These socials are held monthly, prior to our regular monthly meeting. You do not have to be a regular member of CCA to participate in this. Anyone wishing to be a part of this should contact John Proudfit or Connie or Cathy.

The first of the CWC and AL tours our committee has organized will take place Tuesday, June 2. Bob Kelly has prepared a portfolio of wonderful photos of the CWC and AL. A slide presentation with these photos will be used for a "virtual tour" for residents who are unable to do a walk through.

Minutes from Campus Care Committee – May19, 2026

Minutes of the Campus Care Alliance Committee

On April 21 2026, the Campus Care Alliance convened at 10:30AM in the AL Education Center Cathy Long co-chair presided. Others in attendance: Staff Members: Karla Stapleton, Health and Wellness Navigator, Mark Lewis, Executive Director. Committee Members: John Proudfit, Don McCrickard, Joyce Hibshman, Joel Dobson, Ted Fritz, Sarah Hester, Bob Kelly, John Jarman, Stuart Brownlee, Tom Morrison and Nancy Reaves.

Recertification survey (state & CMS)

- Surveyors arrived yesterday morning and will be onsite for four days; team includes nurses, a social worker and a Life Safety Code inspector.
- Survey covers North Carolina state laws and CMS/Medicaid rules; scope is broad and intensive, described as a significant ordeal for staff.
- Leadership (Archna and Mark) positioned to be supportive on-site, providing snacks and morale support for staff during the process.
- Outlook: teams are monitoring daily findings, addressing outliers and preparing follow-up actions as surveyors identify issues.

Staffing & recruiting

- Current interim Director of Nursing: Amanda Montgomery until a permanent candidate is identified.
- Recent hiring challenges prompted engagement of an external healthcare recruiter; fee discussed at about 20% of the director annual salary (previous vendor charged 30%) — roughly \$20k–\$30k estimated per placement.
- Recruiting caveat: starting candidates at a low salary to offset fees risks early turnover; leadership expects one-time fee and some refund clauses (e.g., 90-day guarantee with previous firm).

Sara alert (B-Read-E) campaign & usage

- Program framed as a community/beehive concept: two elements (beehive + bee) with Sara = Situational Alert Awareness Response; campaign has been active ~6 years and is being refreshed.
- New materials: updated article, FAQ pass-outs at resident council and a handout to answer common questions; marketing has included Sara messaging for new residents.
- Effectiveness: team reported positive results and real cases where alerts were used; campaign is ongoing (not one-and-done) with plans to re-energize uptake among residents.
- Next step: continue distribution of FAQs and include Sara messaging in tours and newcomer communications to maintain pendant usage.

Active Sara alerts & call-response (Karla report)

- Reported: 16 active Sara alerts this month.
- Care and Wellness Center responded to 11 alerts.
- Resident Health Services responded to 7 alerts.
- 19 incidents classified as false alarms.
- False alarm drivers: accidental button/cord pushes (toilet paper, leaning, pocketing, housekeepers bumping into devices) and daytime resident movement.
- Process: daily reports reviewed in morning huddles to identify rooms with longer response times; staff coaching or disciplinary action applied for repeat issues.
- Outlook: track daytime false-alarm patterns and share trends so education can target common behaviors/locations.

Falls and response metrics (Mark/Josh summary)

- April metrics: 7,292 call events; average response time 6.7 minutes with known outliers being addressed.
- Falls: 16 unwitnessed falls in the health center for April; assisted living/memory care had 7 unwitnessed and 1 witnessed fall (noted as somewhat high given 36 beds).
- Actions: Josh and Mark (and Ginger) to review programming and update prevention measures where required; morning huddles survey rooms with longer responses for staff follow-up.

Exit interviews (Joyce report)

- 7 exit interviews completed since last meeting.
- 6 of 7 reported they were not offered wristbands at admission.
- 4 of 7 said they were not told about the host program.
- Medication communication: 3 said they were told what meds were; 3 said they were not; one reported meds were placed on tray and not observed taken.
- Other themes: difficulty retrieving discharge medications (required multiple returns), food temperature concerns (coffee not hot enough), room temperature variability and shower scheduling inconsistency.
- Safety note: one resident fell trying to reach an inaccessible pull-cord in the bathroom; chart review showed documentation of showers/sponge baths — leadership followed up on that charting and care details.
- Outlook: leadership (Josh and Mark) will review processes for admissions (wristband offer), med administration observation, food/temp control and shower scheduling.

Remotes, name visibility and resident experience

- Complaint trend: remotes in care center described as overly complex (reports of ~63 buttons), suggesting a usability problem for some residents.
- Suggested mitigation: consider replacing remotes with simplified 4-button units (volume up/down, channel up/down) for care center rooms where appropriate; William Ridgeway to explore look into the situation. Mark Lewis stated that they could purchase the remotes with fewer buttons.
- Staff name tag placement inconsistent; some name tags worn at waist limiting visibility — recommendation to standardize placement so residents can identify staff easily.

Recycling Committee Meeting Minutes

May 11, 2026, 10:00 am

Our primary focus remains on increasing participation and reducing waste by addressing contamination and outdated guidelines. Key updates include:

- Plastic Bag Recycling: We have transitioned to a new tracking system with a goal of 250 pounds of plastic per quarter. We have collected 139 pounds to date. Please ensure all labels are removed from plastic bags and packaging before recycling. We are seeking volunteers to assist with transporting collected plastic to the local grocery store.
- Dining Updates: A recommendation has been made to transition from plastic clamshells to more cost-effective Styrofoam takeout containers. Additionally, we will encourage the use of reusable paper bags.
- Education and Outreach: We will continue publishing monthly articles in the "Chit Chat" newsletter. We are also exploring digital signage on internal television screens to reduce paper waste from flyers.
- Infrastructure: We are reviewing the status of glass recycling and the placement of recycling bins in the mailrooms and storage areas. Furthermore, we are considering clearer signage for trash room barrels to better distinguish between waste and recycling.
- New Resident Orientation: We are coordinating with the marketing department to ensure recycling guidelines are included in the orientation process for new residents.

Plant Operations Report:

1007 work orders were completed from April 1 to May 1.

June 30, 2026 Brightview will complete their contract.

July 1, 2026 Smith Landscaping will begin their contract. This company has been in business for 38 years. It was our goal to go with someone who would make our property their priority. The owner will be onsite 48 weeks out of 52 weeks. Work done in the fall is very important to make things look good in the spring. Joel will plan a Meet & Greet so that residents can meet our new landscapers and address any personal landscaping suggestions.

Frequently asked questions about WhiteStone's SARA Alert System. SARA stands for Situational Awareness & Response Assistant

1. How do I activate my SARA device?

Press firmly on the center of the device-a red light will come on and it will vibrate-light will stay on until the device is reset.

2. Who responds to SARA alerts?

Security & on duty nurse, but security is the first responder.

3. How will they know where I am ?

The entire campus is mapped, and the SARA alert system will send responders to the location where the device was activated.

4. Can I push my SARA button for another person or situation in need?

Yes, security will respond to the location of the person activating the alert.

5. How do I know if it's working?

If you push it firmly a red light will appear and stay on until it has been cleared. Units are checked regularly, but should the battery be low, a yellow glow will appear, and security will also be notified.

6. What if I accidentally set off the SARA alert?

It can happen and security will respond and reset.

7. Is SARA more effective than calling security or nursing on the phone?

Yes, security is the first responder.

8. Does it work off campus?

No it does not. It's only effective in the WhiteStone campus area.

9. Can I wear it in the shower?

Yes, and it's encouraged. Housing is sealed and has an IP67 rating. Also be sure to wear during exercise sessions. Use in the salt water pool is not recommended.

10. I have SARA on my nightstand at night, is that acceptable?

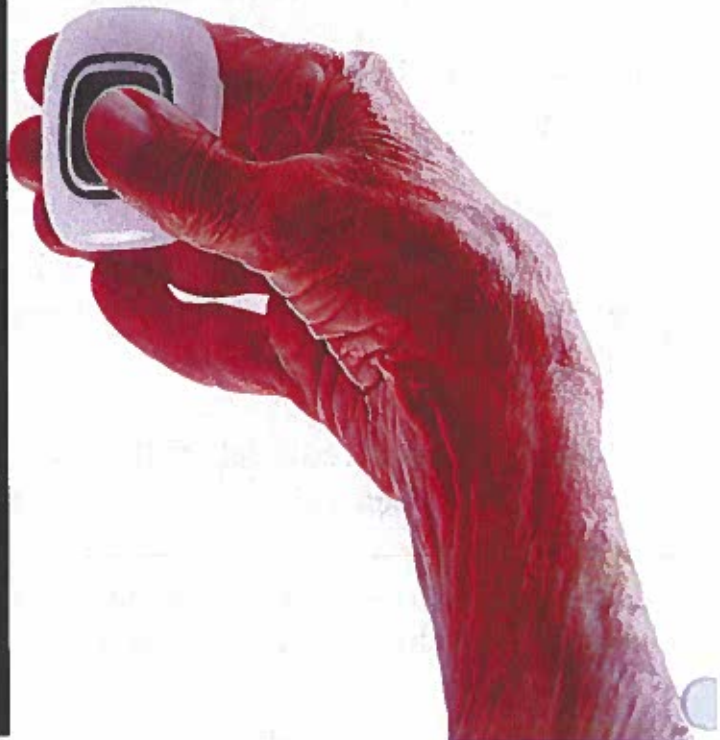
Sure! Provided you take it into the bathroom with you.

11. Can I use a different cord on my device?

Yes. The neck cord provided has a breakaway feature, alternate cords you may use should be light enough to be broken if necessary.

12. I have an alert system on my phone-can it be synchronized to the SARA system?
